

What happens to information shared with IIMM?




Preserving information

They then connect your information to other evidence to build case files against alleged perpetrators to show they have committed serious international crimes. These case files can be used by courts or tribunals to prosecute and potentially punish the perpetrators.




Criminal investigations must be kept confidential, otherwise we risk weakening the case when it is brought to court, and we could compromise the safety and privacy of those who have provided information to us. We therefore can only give you general feedback on how your information is used to build cases, without disclosing specific details about the investigations.

Sharing information

IIMM assists authorities in national, regional or international courts or tribunals with their investigations and prosecutions of serious international crimes committed in Myanmar.

They can request information from IIMM.



Information that you provided is shared only with your consent and only with authorities that:



respect the confidentiality commitments made by IIMM



can protect victims and witnesses



ensure the right to a fair trial and comply with international human rights laws and standards



do not impose the death penalty
